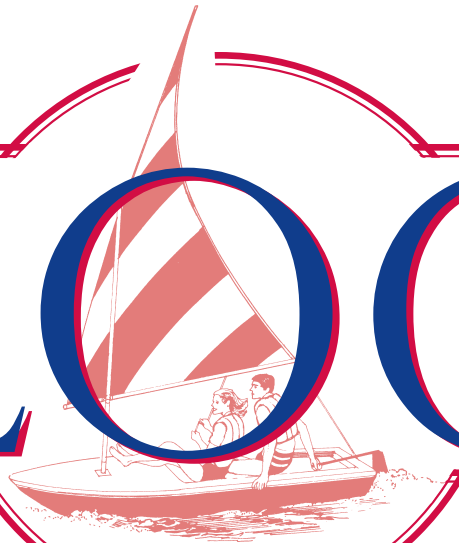

HISTORIAN'S REPORT: Looking Back

This month: LOW WATER LEVEL IN 1955

As we experience low water and an early end to our sailing season this year, I recalled mention of an early construction project that impacted the sail club. I quote Emmy Koehler, original Club Historian:

"But the year 1955 was not yet over. Some of the top men of the Big Thompson Project (of which Carter Lake is a part) decided that some valves had to be checked or repaired. In order to do this, the water was let out to 5' below dead water level (the latter is below the out- or inlet). This time we were really way down, below the large inlet cement structure. We used to anchor our boats on it and had a grand time hollering into the cavern—our mouth of the tunnel."

Hmm. Somehow, no matter how low the water or extensive the construction, I doubt we will be allowed to holler into the tunnel.

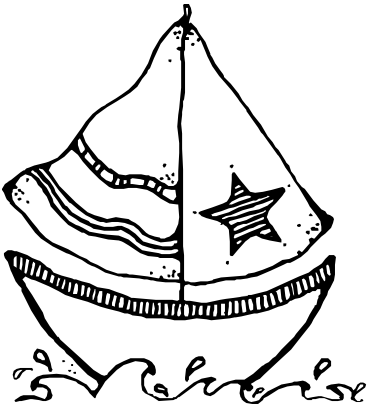
